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Foreword

What Foundations Will Do for You

I once built a log cabin in the Sierra Mountains of northern California. After ten backbreaking weeks of clearing forest land, all I had to show for my effort was a leveled and squared concrete foundation. I was discouraged, but my father, who built over a hundred church buildings in his lifetime, said, "Cheer up, son! Once you've laid the foundation, the most important work is behind you." I've since learned that this is a principle for all of life: You can never build anything larger than the foundation can handle.

The foundation of any building determines both its size and strength and the same is true of our lives. A life built on a false or faulty foundation will never reach the height that God intends for it to reach. If you skimp on your foundation, you limit your life.

That's why this material is so vitally important. *Foundations* is the biblical basis of a purpose-driven life. You must understand these life-changing truths to enjoy God's purposes for you. This curriculum has been taught, tested, and refined over ten years with thousands of people at Saddleback Church. I've often said that *Foundations* is the most important class in our church.

Why You Need a Biblical Foundation for Life

• It's the source of personal growth and stability. So many of the problems in our lives are caused by faulty thinking. That's why Jesus said the truth will set us free and why Colossians 2:7 (CEV) says,

Plant your roots in Christ and let him be the foundation for your life.

• It's the underpinning of a healthy family. Proverbs 24:3 (GNT) says,

Homes are built on the foundation of wisdom and understanding.

In a world that is constantly changing, strong families are based on God's unchanging truth.

• It's the starting point of leadership. You can never lead people farther than you've gone yourself. Proverbs 16:12b (THE MESSAGE) says,

Sound leadership has a moral foundation.

• It's the basis for your eternal reward in heaven. Paul said,

Whatever we build on that foundation will be tested by fire on the day of judgment... We will be rewarded if our building is left standing.

1 CORINTHIANS 3:12, 14 (CEV)

• God's truth is the only foundation that will last. The Bible tells us that:

The sound, wholesome teachings of the Lord Jesus Christ . . . are the foundation for a godly life.

1 TIMOTHY 6:3 (NLT96)

and that,

God's truth stands firm like a foundation stone.

2 TIMOTHY 2:19 (NLT)

Jesus concluded his Sermon on the Mount with a story illustrating this important truth. Two houses were built on different foundations. The house built on sand was destroyed when rain, floods, and wind swept it away. But the house built on the foundation of solid rock remained firm. He concluded,

> "Therefore everyone who hears these words of mine and puts them into practice is like a wise man who built his house on the rock."

LIVING ON PURPOSE

Worship, Fellowship, Discipleship, Ministry & Evangelism

This week we focus on the purpose of evangelism.

The truth we have learned in this session is hell is a real place, and those who do not know Jesus Christ are not rescued from it. For many of us, this truth immediately brings to mind those we know and love who do not have a relationship with Jesus. The thought of them spending eternity separated from God is almost too painful for us to bear. As Tom shared, we must not give up hope and we must entrust them to God.

When we realize that many of those we know and love may spend eternity separated from God, we are faced to ask ourselves, "What is God's part, and what is my part?" What is our responsibility to those who do not know Jesus as Savior and Rescuer? Whom do you know that needs to hear the message of Jesus' sacrifice for them? For whom will you begin to pray for an opportunity to share with them this week? You can use the **Circles of Influence** in the **Small Group Resources** section on page 50 to help you identify those with whom you might share.

What Happens to People in Hell?

Physical Torment

There 'the worms that eat them never die, and the fire that burns them is never put out.'"

WHERE DO PEOPLE GO NOW WHEN THEY DIE?

The progressive revelation of the afterlife in the Bible is defined in three primary ways.

- 1. In much of the Old Testament, the afterlife was seen as shadowy and unknown.
- 2. During the intertestamental period (the 400 years between the final events of the Old Testament and the first events of the New Testament), the Jewish concept of sheol had progressed to the stage where it was believed that sheol had two distinct compartments.
 - a. One section was a place of torment for the wicked, called

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b. The other was a place of conscious bliss, often called

"Now there was a rich man, and he habitually dressed in purple and fine linen, joyously living in splendor every day. And a poor man named Lazarus was laid at his gate, covered with sores, and longing to be fed from the crumbs which fell from the rich man's table; besides, even the dogs were coming and licking his sores.Now the poor man died and was carried away by the angels to Abraham's bosom; and the rich man also died and was buried. In Hades he lifted his eyes, being in torment, and saw Abraham far away and Lazarus in his bosom. And he cried out and said, 'Father Abraham, have mercy on me and send Lazarus so that he may dip the tip of his finger in water and cool off my tongue, for I am in agony in this flame.' But Abraham said, 'Child, remember that during your life you received your good things, and likewise Lazarus bad things; but now he is being comforted here, and you are in agony. And besides all this, between us and you there is a great fixed, so that those who want to go over from here to you will not be able, and that none may cross over from there to us.' And he said, 'Then I beg you, father, that you send him to my father's house-for I have five brothers—in order that he may warn them, so that they will not also come to this place of torment.' But Abraham said, 'They have Moses and the Prophets; let them hear them.' But he said, 'No, father Abraham, but if someone goes to them from the dead, they will repent!' But he said to him, 'If they do not listen to Moses and the Prophets, they will not be persuaded even if someone rises from the dead.""

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

Why is this thought a great misconception? How does the illustration in Mark 9:43 help you understand the physical torment of those who go to hell? When sharing about the afterlife, why should the concept of eternal separation from God be important to someone who has never had a relationship with God?
- 4. What confidence do Paul's words in 2 Corinthians 5:6–8 and Philippians 1:23 give you after all this talk about hell?

"If you have friends or family who have died and you're frightened may be separated from God in hell, trust God as the perfect and just judge. Leave it in his hands.

"If you have friends or family who are alive and who have not yet called upon Jesus to rescue them, ask God for a new boldness to tell them the good news of Christ's love—the good news that Jesus came to forgive our sins if we will trust him."

The Timing of the Rapture

Will babies or children who die go to heaven? Yes! Although they are not old enough to be saved, they are kept safe by God's grace. A child (or someone who is mentally handicapped) who dies before reaching the age that they can understand their sin and need for Christ will not be held accountable for what they cannot understand. That would violate both God's justice and God's grace. Although the Bible does not directly answer this question, we can see two specific indications that the answer is yes.

1. God is just and righteous in everything he does.

The LORD is righteous in all his ways and loving toward all he has made.

PRAYER DIRECTION

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Helps for Hosts

Top Ten Ideas for New Hosts

CONGRATULATIONS! As the host of your small group, you have responded to the call to help shepherd Jesus' flock. Few other tasks in the family of God surpass the contribution you will be making. As you prepare to facilitate your group, whether it is one session or the entire series, here are a few thoughts to keep in mind. Remember you are not alone. God knows everything about you, and he knew you would be asked to facilitate your group. You may not feel ready; this is common for all good hosts. God promises, *"I will never leave you; I will never abandon you*" (Hebrews 13:5, NCV). Whether you are facilitating for one evening, several weeks, or a lifetime, you will be blessed as you serve.

- 1. Don't try to do it alone. Pray right now for God to help you build a healthy team. If you can enlist a co-host to help you shepherd the group, you will find your experience much richer. This is your chance to involve as many people as you can in building a healthy group. All you have to do is ask people to help. You'll be surprised at the response.
- 2. Be friendly and be yourself. God wants to use your unique gifts and temperament. Be sure to greet people at the door with a big smile . . . this can set the mood for the whole gathering. Remember, they are taking as big of a step to show up for this study as you are to host a small group! Don't try to do things exactly like another host; do them in a way that fits you. Admit when you don't have an answer and apologize when you make a mistake. Your group will love you for it and you'll sleep better at night.
- 3. Prepare for your meeting ahead of time. Review the session and write down your responses to each question. Pay special attention to the LIVING ON PURPOSE section in each session that focuses on one God's five purposes for our lives that Rick Warren identifies in *The Purpose Driven Life*. This section will also help your group live out what the Bible teaches, not just talk about it.

- 4. Pray for your group members by name. Before your group arrives, take a few moments and pray for each member by name. You may want to review the Small Group Prayer and Praise Report at least once a week. Ask God to use your time together to touch the heart of each person in your group. Expect God to lead you to whomever he wants you to encourage or challenge in a special way. If you listen, God will surely lead.
- 5. When you ask a question, be patient. Someone will eventually respond. Sometimes people need a moment or two of silence to think about the question. If silence doesn't bother you, it won't bother anyone else. After someone responds, affirm the response with a simple, "Thanks," or "Great answer." Then ask, "How about somebody else?" or "Would someone who hasn't shared like to add anything?" Be sensitive to new people or reluctant members who aren't ready to say, pray, or do anything. If you give them a safe setting, they will blossom over time. If someone in your group is a wallflower who sits silently through every session, consider talking to that person privately and encouraging them to participate. Let them know how important they are to you—that they are loved and appreciated, and that the group would value their input. Remember, still water often runs deep.
- **6. Provide transitions between questions.** Ask if anyone would like to read a paragraph or Bible passage. Don't call on anyone, but ask for a volunteer, and then be patient until someone begins. Be sure to thank the person who reads aloud.
- 7. Break into smaller groups occasionally. With a greater opportunity to talk in a small circle, people will connect more with the study, apply more quickly what they're learning, and ultimately get more out of their small group experience. A small circle also encourages a quiet person to participate and tends to minimize the effects of a more vocal or dominant member.
- 8. Small circles are also helpful during prayer time. People who are unaccustomed to praying aloud will feel more comfortable trying it with just two or three others. Also, prayer requests won't take as much time, so circles will have more time to actually pray. When you gather back with the whole group, you can have one person from each circle briefly update everyone on the prayer requests from their subgroups. The other great aspect of subgrouping is that it fosters leadership development. As you ask people in the group to facilitate discussion or to lead a prayer circle, it gives them a small leadership step that can build their confidence.

- **9.** Rotate facilitators occasionally. You may be perfectly capable of hosting each time, but you will help others grow in their faith and gifts if you give them opportunities to host the group.
- 10. One final challenge (for new or first-time hosts). Before your first opportunity to lead, look up each of the six passages listed below. Read each one as a devotional exercise to help prepare you with a shepherd's heart. Trust us on this one. If you do this, you will be more than ready for your first meeting.

When [Jesus] saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field."

MATTHEW 9:36-38 (NIV)

I am the good shepherd; I know my sheep and my sheep know me—just as the Father knows me and I know the Father—and I lay down my life for the sheep.

JOHN 10:14-15 (NIV)

Be shepherds of God's flock that is under your care, serving as overseers—not because you must, but because you are willing, as God wants you to be; not greedy for money, but eager to serve; not lording it over those entrusted to you, but being examples to the flock. And when the Chief Shepherd appears, you will receive the crown of glory that will never fade away.

1 PETER 5:2-4 (NIV84)

If you have any encouragement from being united with Christ, if any comfort from his love, if any fellowship with the Spirit, if any tenderness and compassion, then make my joy complete by being likeminded, having the same love, being one in spirit and purpose. Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit, but in humility consider others better than yourselves. Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also to the interests of others. Your attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus.

Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful. And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds. Let us not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another— and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

Frequently Asked Questions

How Long Will This Group Meet?

This study is four sessions long. We encourage your group to add an extra session for a celebration. In your final session, each group member may decide if he or she desires to continue on for another study. At that time you may also want to do some informal evaluation, discuss your group guidelines, and decide which study you want to do next. We recommend you visit *saddleback.com/watch* for more video-based small group studies.

Who Is the Host?

The host is the person who coordinates and facilitates your group meetings. In addition to being a host, we encourage you to select one or more group members to lead your group discussions. Several other responsibilities can be rotated, including refreshments, prayer requests, worship, or keeping up with those who miss a meeting. Shared ownership in the group helps everybody grow.

Where Do We Find New Group Members?

Recruiting new members can be a challenge for groups, especially new groups with just a few people, or existing groups that lose a few people along the way. We encourage you to use the **Circles of Influence** diagram on page **50** of this study to brainstorm a list of people from your workplace, church, school, neighborhood, family, and so on. Then pray for the people on each member's list. Allow each member to invite several people from their list. Some groups fear that newcomers will interrupt the intimacy that members have built over time. However, groups that welcome newcomers generally gain strength with the infusion of new blood. Remember, the next person you add just might become a friend for eternity. Logistically, groups find different ways to add members. Some groups remain permanently open, while others choose to open periodically, such as at the beginning or end of a study. If your group becomes too large for easy, face-to-face conversations, you can subgroup, forming a second discussion group in another room.

How Do We Handle the Childcare Needs in Our Group?

Childcare needs must be handled very carefully. This is a sensitive issue. We suggest you seek creative solutions as a group. One common solution is to have the adults meet in the living room and share the cost of a babysitter (or two) who can be with the kids in another part of the house. Another popular option is to have one supervised home for the kids and a second home (close by) for the adults. If desired, the adults could rotate the responsibility of providing a lesson for the kids. This last option is great with school-age kids and can be a huge blessing to families.

Circles of Influence

Discover Who You Can Connect in Community

Use this chart to help carry out one of the values in the **Small Group Guidelines** to "Welcome Newcomers." Follow this simple, three-step process: 1) List one to two people in each circle. 2) Prayerfully select one person or couple from your list, and tell your group about them. 3) Give them a call and invite them to your next meeting. Over fifty percent of those invited to a small group say, "Yes!"



Small Group Guidelines

It's a good idea for every group to put words to their shared values, expectations, and commitments. Such guidelines will help you avoid unspoken agendas and unmet expectations. We recommend you discuss your guidelines during your meeting in order to lay the foundation for a healthy group experience. Feel free to modify anything that does not work for your group.

We agree to the following values:

Clear Purpose

To grow healthy spiritual lives by building a healthy small group community

Group Attendance

To give priority to the group meeting (call if I am absent or late)

Safe Environment

To create a safe place where people can be heard and feel loved (no quick answers, snap judgments, or simple fixes)

Be Confidential

To keep anything that is shared strictly confidential and within the group

Conflict Resolution

To avoid gossip and to immediately resolve any concerns by following the principles of Matthew 18:15-17

Spiritual Health

To give group members permission to speak into my life and help me live a healthy, balanced spiritual life that is pleasing to God

Limit Our Freedom

To limit our freedom by not serving or consuming alcohol during small group meetings or events so as to avoid causing a weaker brother or sister to stumble (1 Corinthians 8:1–13; Romans 14:19–21)

Welcome Newcomers

To invite friends who might benefit from this study and warmly welcome newcomers

Build Relationships

To get to know the other members of the group and pray for them regularly

Session One The Heartbreaking Reality of Hell

IS HELL A REAL PLACE?

Who is the one who judges and does the separating? **JESUS**, the only righteous one.

WHY WAS HELL CREATED?

- Hell was not created originally for any human being, but for <u>SATAN AND</u> HIS ANGELS.
- Contrary to popular opinion, Satan is not yet confined to hell. He now resides ON EARTH.
- One day (according to the book of Revelation), God is going to cast Satan, death, and hades into the LAKE OF FIRE (another name for hell).

WHAT ABOUT THE PEOPLE I LOVE?

- If they're still living, DON'T GIVE UP HOPE.
- If they've already died, **TRUST THEM TO GOD**.

Session Two

The Truth about Hell WHERE DO PEOPLE GO WHEN THEY DIE?

- a. One section was a place of torment for the wicked, called <u>HADES</u>.
- b. The other was a place of conscious bliss, often called <u>ABRAHAM'S BOSOM</u> or **PARADISE**.

A CLOSER LOOK

- There is **NO REST** from torment.
- There are no **SECOND CHANCES**.

How Can I Be Sure I Won't Spend Eternity in Hell?

The crime that will send a person to hell is: **REJECTING** Jesus Christ as the Son of God, the Savior we all need.

Session Three

The Truth about Heaven WHERE IS HEAVEN?

- Heaven is <u>UP</u>.
- In the Old Testament, heaven is spoken of figuratively in terms of layers of sky. The heavens are where the birds fly, the trees breathe, and the rain falls. This was referred to as the **FIRST HEAVEN**.
- The heavens are also where the moon and stars move in their orbits. This was referred to as the **SECOND HEAVEN**.
